Deutz-Fahr is a German brand of agricultural machinery and tractors. The brand originated from the agricultural division of Klöckner-Humboldt-Deutz AG

The brand originated from the agricultural division of Klöckner-Humboldt-Deutz AG (KHD), the tractor manufacturer Fahr, and the threshing machine producer Ködel & Böhm. Since 1995, Deutz-Fahr has been part of the Italian company SDF (formerly SAME Deutz-Fahr).

Tractors of the Agrotron 6.4 Series, 6 Series, 7 Series, 8 Series, and 9 Series are manufactured at the plant in Lauingen, which was inaugurated in 2017 under the name Deutz-Fahr Land, for distribution worldwide.

Magirus is one of the largest manufacturers of fire fighting equipment. Its fire trucks are primarily based upon chassis and engines from Iveco, but occasionally also uses platforms from other truck manufacturers.

Iveco, owner of Magirus since 1975, sold the business in 2024 and Magirus is now an independent business, owned by investment company Mutares SE.

Deutz-Allis was eventually sold to the Allis-Gleaner Corporation, or AGCO), in 1990. Deutz-Allis tractors and equipment were renamed in North America to be AGCO-Allis, but continued in South America until 2001, when the South American operations were renamed AGCO-Allis.

In Argentina, the company manufactured the Deutz-Allis 5.125 L and the Deutz-Allis 5.190.

In North America, Deutz-Allis tractors carried both the traditional Deutz-green color, and Allis-orange color. In South America they were Deutz-green.

Köln Messe/Deutz station

Köln Messe/Deutz station (called Köln-Deutz until November 2004, Colognian: Düx, pronounced [d?ks]) is an important railway junction for long-distance

Köln Messe/Deutz station (called Köln-Deutz until November 2004, Colognian: Düx, pronounced [d?ks]) is an important railway junction for long-distance rail and local services in the Deutz neighborhood of Cologne in the German state of North Rhine-Westphalia. It is situated close to the eastern bank of the Rhine and connected via the Hohenzollern Bridge to Köln Hauptbahnhof, the city's main station, which is just a few hundred metres away. The Cologne Trade Fair (German: Koelnmesse) grounds are directly north of the station, hence the Messe in the station's name. The Deutz/Messe station of the Cologne Stadtbahn is nearby and connected to this station by a pedestrian tunnel.

Köln Messe/Deutz is a junction station, which has platforms on two levels: the high-level platforms are used by trains running in the east-west direction across the Hohenzollern Bridge to and from Köln Hauptbahnhof. The lower level (Köln Messe/Deutz tief) is used by trains running in a north-south direction bypassing the Hauptbahnhof between Köln-Mülheim station and Troisdorf. It serves an important function in providing some relief for the Köln Hauptbahnhof bottleneck—some ICE services call at Köln-Deutz instead, eliminating the need for changing direction, while many regional trains from the west terminate here.
